INSIDER STATUS

"And who knows but that you have come to royal position for such a time as this?" (Esther 4:14, NIV)

BEGINNING SUNDAY, MORE THAN 300 PGA PROFESSIONALS will tee off near Monterey, California, in the PGA Professional National Championship. This is the event that qualifies 20 club pros for the PGA Championship in August. Among those making an attempt at that prestigious honor, which he has accomplished once before, is Links Players president Jeffrey Cranford.

Among other things, this caliber of competition—not to mention the successful play it took for him to get here out of the challenging Southern California PGA section—makes Jeff an insider. When it comes to golf, he really gets it.
